Almond Acreage in CA Grows to Record Total - 1.3 Million Acres

California's almond acreage grew 7 percent last year to a record 1.3 million acres, as the state continued its dominance as the world's leading producer of almonds.

The state grows more than 80 percent of the world's supply. In 2016, California's almond crop was valued at more than \$5 billion.

Of the state's total almond acres, 1 million acres are producing almonds and 330,000 acres of trees are still maturing, according to the U.S. Department of Agriculture's almond acreage report.

MVBA Meeting Minutes

May 7, 2018

Meeting called to order at 7 PM. There were 68 guests and members in attendance.

Announcements for May:

Deb from Brukner Nature Center gave us a Brukner update. They have also begun grant writing for the barn building.

MVBA Apiary Report: they are going to split the hives that overwintered. The package installed in April is doing well.

John Gonzales gave the financial report. The club has a current balance of \$1958 and took in 1 new member in April.

Terry Lieberman-Smith gave an OSBA update. There are 201 Apiary Diagnostic Kits still available. The OSBA Fall Conference is November 3, 2018.

Vickie Bowman announced that MVBA club members who order queens from her will get a discounted price of \$30 but they must be picked up.

Robert Dorsten opened the floor for question and answer time.

Q: How do I get my bees to get water from a water source of my choosing?

A: Bees will get water where they want, but you can encourage them by adding chlorine to the water source you want them to use. There is no guarantee, however.

Q: If you cut out bad or destroyed comb from a frame with no foundation, will they always refill that with drone comb?

A: Yes, generally they will.

Guest speaker Tim Arheit of Honey Run Apiaries, from the OSBA Traveling Speaker series, presented on "Sustainable Beekeeping: Nucs." What is a "Nuc?" It is a small hive with every resource a full-sized hive has.

Why keep nucs? Reasons for keeping nucs include holding replacement queens until you are ready to place her in her own hive, swarm control, breaking a brood cycle, increasing your apiary, or having extra resources on hand to strengthen weak hives.

Tim detailed the equipment, the methods of creating nucs, splitting, and overwintering.

Nucs for sustainability means having extra resources in your own bee yard to properly manage your apiary.

Next meeting is June 4, 2018.

The Basic Buzz in the Apiary

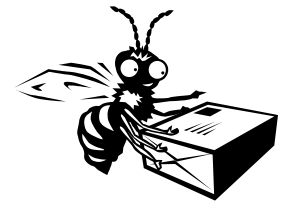
June

- Continue to check for queen cells.
- Rear queens if you prefer your own stock.
- Check colonies for disease and monitor for mites.
- Remove comb honey supers when properly sealed.
- Provide plenty of super space.
- Control swarming.
- Capture swarms

July

- Remove comb honey supers when properly sealed.
- Check for queen cells, especially in colonies used for queen rearing.
- Add sufficient super space (undersuper).
- Remove and extract early season honey crop.
- Freeze comb honey to prevent wax moth damage
- Prepare for the Fair!
