Beekeeping Resources: Finding the gold nuggets

MVBA Meeting Minutes June 6, 2022

Attended by 17 in person and 3 on zoom.

Opening announcements by Fran Davidson, Vice President.

Fran and Tom Davidson gave a review of their presentation on National Bees Day at the STEM School in Dayton. During their hour long educational talk to 8th and 9th graders they also showed videos of catching a swarm, installing a package, the biology of bees and brought along an exhibition hive with bees. It was well received and the students asked lots of questions.

Announcements – Members were given the opportunity to sign up to have their business contact information added to the MVBA website for the sale of honey, queens, nucs, equipment, and all things bee related. Questions from members -

What is undersupering? When you add a honey super under an existing one to make it easier for the bees to access and work it.

What should the water content be when you extract honey? Less than 18%. The bees cap the honey when it is approximately 18%. You should only extract frames that are 80 – 90% capped. If you want to verify the moisture content of the honey, you can purchase a refractometer fairly cheaply.

Program: Honeycomb Management presented by Mark Beougher, OSBA Traveling Speaker.

Very educational program on how bees make honeycomb, what age they are when they produce wax, how you can tell what the wax is used for in the hive depending on the color, uses for comb, how to manipulate the frames for nice comb, what to do with burr comb, how to properly store comb and drawn frames, and why drawn comb is a such a valuable commodity to beekeepers. The program was packed with great information!

Nectar Sources: Basswood (American Linden). Yellow Sweet Clover, White Sweet Clover, Milkweed, Mints, Bergamot, Loosestrifes, Vetches,

Nectar and Pollen: Catalpa, Bramble fruits, Roses, Coneflowers, Ohio Buckeye, Rubeckia, Thistles, Hyssops, Coreopsis, Caryopteris

Pollen: St. John's Wort

The Basic Buzz in the Apiary

July

- Remove comb honey supers when properly sealed.
- Check for queen cells, especially in colonies used for queen rearing.
- Add sufficient super space (undersuper).
- Remove and extract early season honey crop.
- Freeze comb honey to prevent wax moth damage

August

- Check colonies for disease and monitor/treat for mites
- Remove and extract summer honey crop
- Remove section Supers
- Do not work bees unless necessary to avoid robbing
- Add more supers if needed.
- Consider re-queening for a winter-ready hive.
