#### **MVBA** Elections

MVBA will hold elections at the November meeting as required by our club Constitution. This is a great way to get involved and help ensure the club's future. Positions and descriptions are:

- President The duties of the President shall be to preside at all meetings. The President shall be a de facto member of all committees. In the event of a tied vote, the President's vote shall be weighted. NOTE: The President also secures speakers for each meeting.
- Vice President The duties of the Vice President shall be to assist the President and preside at any meeting during the absence of the President.



- Secretary The Secretary shall keep a record of all proceedings at all
  meetings and send a copy to all the board members via email. Keep a record of all active members
  and update the list as needed. Create any signup sheets needed throughout the year.
- Treasurer Keep the list of active membership. Keep a record of all monies collected for the Association and all monies disbursed, and prepare an annual report for the first meeting of each year.
   There will also be an annual audit performed during the November meeting by a committee of three (3) members appointed by the President.
- Member At-Large (2 positions) Member of the Executive Board.

These 6 positions make up the Executive Board.

# **MVBA Secretary Report October 3, 2022**

President Jeff Adler opened the meeting at 7pm. He welcomed those in attendance (23) and on those on zoom (1). Treasurer Brian Willis gave the Treasurer's Report. The OSBA Fall Conference will be held October 28 and 29 in Wooster, Ohio at the OARDC Campus. (It has since been cancelled)

MVBA will sponsor Keenan and Caitlin Hartley in 4H Youth Scholarship in beekeeping. Tom and Fran Davidson will be their mentors.

Apiary reminders – Get ready for winter by treating your hives, taking inventory or replenishing supplies, cleaning equipment, reflect on your practices from this year and what worked and what you'd like to change, and look for and attend conferences.

Fall festivals are a great place to sell your honey.

Last meeting of the year will be November 7<sup>th</sup> at 7:00 pm at the Tipp City Library. Elections for the MVBA Board will be held along with a potluck and/or desserts provided by members. You're encouraged to bring a dish and any tools or gadgets to share that you find useful in your apiary.

Presentation by Dr. Meghan Milbrath, Michigan State University Department of Entomology on "Towards Treatment Free". She discussed why just letting your bees fend for themselves against disease is not the way to achieve treatment free. She referenced a study performed on Gotland Island over a decade ago where 150 colonies were placed there and left to their own defenses against parasites as a research project. In a few years it declined to 12 colonies. The remaining bees were very small, didn't pro-

duce honey and were infested with varroa. If bees don't have the tools to get rid of the varroa mites, they are not going to be able to survive. Resistance takes a really long time to develop, and we live in a highly connected beekeeping world. Every beekeeper needs to manage their parasites.

She uses more than one type of treatment because varroa can develop a resistance. She uses Formic Pro in summer and again when removing honey, then oxalic at the end of the brood season, because oxalic damages brood. Hop Guard III is derived from hops and is not incredibly strong. It is good for a nuc, split or a very small colony and can be used with honey supers on.

She does NOT recommend putting things in your hives that have not been long term tested.

# Home-Made version of Honey Bee Healthy (adapted from Beesource)

5 cups water
2 ½ pounds of sugar
15 drops spearmint oil
15 drops lemongrass oil

Heat the water to a boil. Remove from heat and stir in the sugar until dissolved. Once the sugar water has cooled, add the essential oils. Stir until everything is evenly distributed.

This solution should have a strong scent and not be left open around bees.

Cool completely before using.

I store this concentrate in the fridge -label it so that your family doesn't drink it!!

Approx. dosage: 1 tsp per quart of 1:1 sugar syrup for feeding

#### Marshmallow Bee Fondant

3 bags (10.5 oz) marshmallows ½ c. water 4 pounds confectioners sugar 1 t. Homemade mix from recipe above

Put marshmallows in a microwave safe bowl. Bowl needs to be large because marshmallows will puff up and cause a mess if they overflow. Pour water over marshmallows. Microwave, 20 seconds at a time, until melted.

Carefully remove from microwave. Stir in powdered sugar and Honey B Healthy. Once it is difficult to stir, turn out on cutting board or countertop that has been dusted with confectioner's sugar. Knead in remaining sugar.

Coat the fondant with a light layer of shortening to help keep it moist. Wrap in several layers of plastic wrap.


