Fellow Beekeepers -

Have you noticed all of the signs of spring?

- ☑ We shifted our clocks forward an hour
- ☑ Birds are singing in the morning
- ☑ Crocuses are in bloom
- ☑ The grass is greening up
- ☑ Your bees have been doing orientation flights

That last one has really gotten my attention lately. I love seeing the figure-8's and all the hive activity. It makes me breathe a sigh of relief that those hives made it through winter BUT also gives me some anxiety that it's time to prepare for spring splits before we get to swarming season. Ah, one of the many stresses of this crazy hobby...

Preparation is your best strategy for anxiety relief. We should always be thinking one season ahead of the calendar, so that means it's time to get ready for that first nectar flow. Here are some suggestions:

- Decide if you need to feed weaker colonies or combine any "duds".
- Inspect your honey supers. Do you have enough? Any evidence of wax moths?
- Will you do any varroa treatments before putting on honey supers?
- Determine equipment needs: Did you lose a hive tool (or two) in the fall that needs to be replaced? How's that bee suit holding up? Are you going to experiment with something new?

Spring is also a great time to evaluate your beekeeping goals for the coming year to help determine your next steps. Personally, I'm going for honey production and last year's yield was much lower than expected so I'm adjusting my practices accordingly. I've talked with other folks who don't want to expand their apiary, so that changes their approach. In that case it may be good to make splits and build up some nucs to sell as a way to keep the healthy hive populations in check and lower the risk of swarming. Do you want more bees and more hives? Make sure they have the resources to grow.

I am currently in the process of lining up speakers for our monthly meetings and I'm excited with the prospects. The April speaker is Michelle Huskins who I met at this year's Tri-County Beekeepers Association Spring Workshop where she led a series of courses for beginner beekeepers. Michelle has an apiary in Uniontown (near Akron) and runs her own beekeeping business, and I look forward to her talk.

# The Basic Buzz in the Apiary

# **April**

- Monitor colony stores, esp. if weather is cold & wet
- Inspect brood nest for laying queen, disease, etc.
- Introduce package bees on drawn combs
- Requeen colonies with failing queens
- Reverse brood chambers when weather moderates
- Add supers to strong colonies at maple or dandelion bloom
- Unite weak colonies
- Equalize strength of all colonies
- Renew your subscription to Bee Culture and American Bee Journal

# May

- Monitor colonies for queen cells
- Control swarming
- Add more supers as needed (oversuper)
- Place queen excluder below shallow super on colonies for comb honey
- Install packages on foundation
- Split strong colonies
- Capture swarms
- Cull and replace defective combs with full sheets of foundation
- Begin implementing an IPM program for the control of mites
- Add room for bees, either by honey supers, or deeps. Remember the

7/10 rule: when they have filled 7 of the 10 frames, its time to add space!
